HIGHLIGHTS

- In 2000, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation made its first grants to support partners' efforts to improve health and development in Ethiopia.
- Over the past decade, the foundation has made more than 125 grants to organizations working in Ethiopia or conducting research and development that is intended to benefit the country and its citizens.
- The foundation currently has more than \$265 million (U.S.) invested in grants to benefit Ethiopia.
- In 2012, the foundation appointed a representative in Addis Ababa to support closer partnerships with key stakeholders in government, nongovernmental agencies (NGOs), and the private sector.
