# Our work in Washington state



# Overview

Everyone should have access to the opportunities they need to design the future they want. That core belief drives the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's work around the world and in our home state of Washington, where we work at the local, regional, and state level.

Across the state, we focus on education, which we believe is essential to giving young people control over their own lives today and into the future. Nearly 90 percent of Washington's high schoolers say they want to continue their education after high school, but only 50 percent enroll in apprenticeships or two-year and four-year degree programs after graduation. Together with the local schools, colleges, and organizations that know their communities best, we believe we can help close that gap.

Our Washington State team works with partners to help students see a clear path to success after high school, with an emphasis on young people who face the highest barriers—including students from low-income and rural communities, and Black, Latino, and Indigenous students. Through all our work, we strive to listen to the needs, dreams, and perspectives of students and give them a say in decisions about education programs and policies.

# Three ways we're working to help students:

# Supporting local partnerships that are empowering local students

We partner with local organizations who know their communities best to understand how we can support on-the-ground efforts to improve the high school to postsecondary transition for students in their region. We launched two programs to support these locally led solutions: the Limitless Learning Network and our Horizons Regional Grants (more on page 3).

# Expanding evidence-based solutions across the state to reach more students

We work to advance policies and programs that give students the opportunities they need to design their own futures. In Washington state, that means supporting statewide efforts to help students pursue college and career pathways like expanding high-quality advising programs, increasing FAFSA completion to unlock financial aid, and providing equitable access to dual credit programs.

#### Bringing education leaders together to support student success

Partners have shared that they value the Gates Foundation's ability to convene people to work toward common goals and solutions. That's why we launched a statewide funders network and an education roundtable to bring students, educators, education leaders, and philanthropy together to identify common goals and priorities to support students in Washington state.

## Horizons Regional Grant Program

Our Horizons Regional Grant Program is supporting four regional partnerships that are ready to expand programs to help more students transition from K-12 into postsecondary education.

Each Horizons region features a "backbone" organization—which could be a school district,

educational service district (ESD), or nonprofit that coordinates the partnership. Other partners include K-12 school districts, higher education institutions, and workforce, government, and community-based organizations (CBOs).



## Horizons Technical Assistance Partners

In addition to grant funding, each region will receive technical assistance to learn more about high-quality advising strategies and other programs proven to help students take the next step after graduation. Technical assistance providers will also help regions measure the impact of their partnership and build their capacity to access, analyze, and apply data so they can refine programs to meet student needs.

## Horizons Implementation Planning

As a first step, each Horizons region will receive an initial planning grant from the Gates Foundation to work with the technical assistance providers to finalize their partnership's goals and implementation plan. Each region will receive additional funding when their implementation plan is finalized this fall.

### **Horizons Funding Commitment**

The foundation will provide \$19 million in grant funding and technical assistance to help the four Horizons partnerships implement or expand programs so that more students take the next step after high school.




## Limitless Learning Network

The Gates Foundation has committed \$11 million over four years to support the collaboration happening within the Limitless Learning Network.

Through the Limitless Learning Network, practitioners at 26 local partnerships across Washington state have an opportunity to connect with other teams of local K-12 and higher education partners—creating space to share information, explore new ideas, and develop best practices together. All four Horizons regions will participate in Limitless, which reaches about onequarter of all high school students in the state.
